Campbell County Master Gardeners 2019 Seedling Tree Descriptions

Although the species listed have proven adaptable to Wyoming conditions, each species may have limited adaptability to local soil types and conditions.

Shrubs & Deciduous Trees 10" - 30" Top Height

Shrubs

Caragana - Very hardy, upright shrub with a height of 12'-14' on favorable sites; drought and alkaline soil tolerant up to 9,500'; yellow flowers are followed by seed bearing pods; good wildlife species yet resists browsing by deer

Peking Cotoneaster - Slow growing; 6' to 10' avg. height; grows well on most soils up to 8,000 feet; pink to white flowers in spring; red in fall.

Chokecherry - Large, suckering shrub native across the US; may be planted up to 8,000 feet; may reach a height of 15' on favorable sites and grows well on most sites; produces abundant small cherries suitable for jelly or wildlife; fruit may be poisonous to horses

Common Lilac - Upright, suckering, medium to tall shrub which grows 8'-12' tall; purple or white flower colors; one of the better shrubs for windbreak purposes; plant to 8,500 feet; grows well in most soils

Native Plum - A thicket forming, thorny, medium to tall shrub reaching 8'-12' tall on favorable sites; may be planted up to 8,000 feet; white flowers in May are followed by edible yellow to red plums in late summer and fall

Nanking Cherry - Medium sized spreading shrub growing 6'-8' tall on favorable sites; does well on most soils; may be planted to 7,500 feet; white to pink flowers in spring are followed by small edible red cherries in late summer

Nannyberry - Low maintenance; tolerates a wide range of soils; height of 10-18' tall with a 6-12' spread; edible berries for jams and jellies; variable fall color from greenish-yellow to reddish-purple.

Serviceberry—Low maintenance flowering shrub; drought tolerant; tolerates clay soil; edible berries used in jams, jellies, and pies.

Golden Currant - Small to medium shrub reaching a height of 5'-6' tall; fairly drought and alkali tolerant; good cover for small wildlife; plant up to 8,000 feet; fragrant yellow spring flowers followed by dark purple to black fruit suitable for wild-life and jellies

Sumac, Three Leaf - Shrub may reach 3'-6' high; excellent alkaline tolerance; does best up to 8,000 feet

Red-Osier Dogwood - Medium sized, multi-stemmed, lightly suckering shrub which may reach a height of 6'-10' on favorable sites; likes most soils; flood and cold tolerant; stems dark to bright red; white fruit clusters eaten by birds

Trees

Souixland Cottonwood - Tall, fast growing plant in moist soils or in areas with supplemental water below 6,000 feet, usually cotton-less (not guaranteed)

Golden Willow - 35'-50' tall tree, plant same as cotton-less cottonwood but up to 7,500 feet

Hackberry— 40-60' tall tree; tolerates drought and clay soil; yellow fall color

Bur Oak - Medium to tall slow growing tree up to 40'-60' tall; hardy and drought resistant; tolerant of a wide range of soils; acorns good food value for wildlife; plant up to 7,000 feet

Prairie Sky Poplar - Very fast growing tree up to 4 feet yearly up to 65'-80' tall; grows best in full sun on most soils; needs adequate moisture

Honeylocust— Medium to large spreading tree up to 25'-50' tall; adaptable to variable soil conditions

Siberian Elm - tall and drought resistant from 50'-70' tall; in most soils state wide below 6,500 feet; resistant to Dutch Elm disease; fast growing

Manchurian Apricot - Small, fast growing 10' -15', drought resistant, winter hardy

Crabapple, Red Splendor - moderately fast growing small tree that can reach 20'-30'. Has showy pink spring flowers, small edible fall fruit. Intolerant of shade and drought and grows in a variety of soils.

Bareroot Vines

Riverbank Grape - Native grape; may climb 20'-30' high by means of tendrils; fruit is small, purple-blue when ripe and sweet in taste; can be used in jellies and wines

Woodbine - Deciduous vine; prostrate; green summer foliage changing to yellow, purple and red in fall; tough & low maintenance

Large Tubes 5"-12" Top Height

Ponderosa Pine - 40'-50' tall, on most soils of low pH except heavy clay, up to 8,500 feet; One of the best windbreak trees

Eastern Red Cedar - Medium tree to 18' tall, on most soils in the plains below 6,000 feet; drought resistant when established, good windbreak species

Austrian Pine— Tall tree to 40', on most soils of low pH up to 7,000 feet, good windbreak tree

Limber Pine - 30'-45' tall; Prefers loams to sandy soil with a pH of 5.0-7.5; Somewhat drought tolerant; small to medium evergreen for farmstead windbreaks.

Rocky Mountain Juniper - Medium tree 15-18' tall, does well on most soils; 8,000 feet; drought resistant when established; excellent windbreak

Colorado Blue Spruce - Tall tree to 60', slight blue color, on most soils but will grow on drier sites if watered for establishment, to 9,500 feet

GU Aspen - Tall tree, poor drought tolerance; hardy in cold temperatures; plant up to 11,000 feet; not recommended for windbreaks.

Large Tubes Perennials

Rocky Mountain Penstemon - Grows 12" - 36" tall and blooms in the summer. The flowers are deep blue with parts of the corolla violet and whitish. This species likes full sun to partial shade and well drained soils.

Blanket Flower - Reaches 12"-18" height. Blooms June until first frost. Plant in full sun, drought tolerant.

Purple Poppy Mallow—Blooming from April to September with purple flowers. Tolerates full sun, sand, loam, and clay soils. Prefers dry to medium moisture. Great for pollinators, butterflies and deer resistant.

Colorado Blue Columbine—The state flower of Colorado, it is treasured for its big blue and white flowers. Place in cool shady beds that receive regular watering. Blooms in late spring to early summer and reaches 18".

Aspen Fleabane - 6 to 14 inches tall. Each stem bears several showy flowers heads narrow pink, lavender or white rays around a yellow disk. Blooms June, July, and Augusts. Full sun and dry to moist soils.

Wild Bergamot - 2 to 5 foot tall. Clusters of lavender, pink or white flowers, looking like ragged pompoms. Blooms May to September. Sun to part shade with dry to moist soils.

Stiff Goldenrod— Blooming from July—October, it can grow to a mature height anywhere from 1 to 5 feet with clumps of yellow flower heads. Tolerates moderate shade to full sun, prefers dry or moist coarse to medium textured sandy soils.

Firecracker Penstemon—Rapidly growth to mature height of three to four feet with red flowers and show May through August. Adapted to full sunlight; moderate/well-draining, slightly alkaline and dryer soils.

PLAN BEFORE YOU PLANT!!! A planting plan should be prepared before trees are ordered or planted. The planting plan will show the proper location for the planting as well as the best species for your site, spacing between rows, spacing of trees in the row and the correct number of trees and shrubs needed.

WHO ARE MASTER GARDENERS? Master Gardeners are volunteers trained in horticulture by the University of Wyoming Extension Office. They receive approximately 40 hours of classroom instruction on topics including soil management, fruit and vegetable production, tree and shrub care, lawn care, insect and disease ID and management, plant growth and function and flower gardening. In exchange, Master Gardeners volunteer time back to the community through the activities of the Extension Office, bringing accurate, up-to-date horticulture information to the public.
